2001 FALL SEASON ROUNDUP

Despite a total lack of rain all fall, our 34th season of fall season went well. We had a record number of participants in the Fall Intramural Program as 1850 players signed up. This number is in addition to the 38 travel teams that played in the Delco Soccer League and PAGS League.

Our Boys Travel Team Program had one of it's strongest seasons ever as a total of five teams were crowned champions, including two of our 'A' teams who won Division One championships. The LMSC Velez, coached by Miguel Nuila won the Under 10 Division One Delco League championship, finishing the season with a record of 12-0-1 and defeating Tredyffrin-Easttown 5-1 in the championship game.

Also being crowned champions were the LMSC Hammerheads. The Hammerheads, our U-11A team, played up an age group and won the Delco League's Under 12 Division One championship, narrowly defeating the LMSC Natural Disasters 2-1 in overtime in the championship game. This marked the first time that teams from the same club played for a Division One Delco League championship. The Hammerheads are ranked #1 in the nation by National Soccer Rankings (www.nationalsoccerranking.com).

Our Girls Travel Team Program had a great year as eight of our teams either made the playoffs (for U-11 and older teams) or placed in their division. The U-9C Rockets, led by coach Stephen Frank, won their division in their first season of play. The U-14A Rage took second place in the highly competitive Cup Division, consisting of the top teams in Pennsylvania and Delaware.

Our new Pee-Wee Program for four year old players went well in it's first year of operation. The Pee-Wee Program had 200 participants this year. The program was run by Andy Kelly, manager of Rocket Sports and Physical Education teacher at Montgomery County Community College. Our thanks to Andy for the successful debut of this program.

Our Special Needs Program also had another successful year. The program is geared for youngsters with physical or mental limitations. This year's program consisted of over 30 players. LMSC plans to expand the Special Needs Program to two divisions next fall in order to best serve the players and their needs. Our thanks to Steven Spencer who has been running this program so successfully for many years.

BOYS TRAVEL TEAM ROUNDUP

The Under 9A Roadkill had a tremendous first season, finishing with a record of 29-1-0. The team won all four tournaments they played in, winning the Downingtown Spirit Kickoff Classic (4-0-0), the Gettysburg Blast Tournament (6-0-0), the Cape May, NJ Memorial Day Weekend Tournament (4-0-0) and the Parkwood Thanksgiving Tournament (5-0-0). The Roadkill finished the regular season of Delco League play on top of Division One with a record of 9-0-0.

Their only loss of the season came in the Delco League semifinals when they dropped a hard fought 1-0 decision with the only goal of the game coming on a penalty kick. Despite 100% effort, the boys were unable to get the equalizer and went down to defeat.

The team was led by the fantastic defense of goalkeeper Max Kurtzman, along with defenders David Rosenfeld and Michael Lemonick. In the team's 30 games, the defense gave up only 17 goals. The offense was led by the high scoring trio of Julian Crowther, Alex Beatty and Alec Sowers.

The team finished with 158 goals on the year, an average of over five goals a game. Much of the credit to the team's success goes to the high flying midfield that contributed on offense and defense. The midfield consisted of Ryan Dodds, Robbie Rubenstein, Shawn Murphy, Michael Goldman and Matt Fedder.

The Under 9B Predators enjoyed an undefeated, championship season in Division Two this fall. Led by the constant scoring threats of Daniel Posner, Daniel Kursman and Lorenzo Useche-Rodrigo, the Predators compiled a 7-0-1 record in the regular season. That was the best in the division. The tie came at Hockessin in the final regular season game, in which Teddy Seem scored in the last minute, after the Predators had given up two goals on deflections. The Predators then battled to a hard-fought 3-2 overtime victory against Rose Tree in the semi-finals.

The Predators and Hockessin then met again in the final, and played to a 1-1 tie in 80 minutes of intense play. The teams were declared co-champions. Colin Eisenstaedt, Nick Desatnick and Garrett Baker anchored a solid defense, and Adam Garnick excelled at the keeper position.

The opposition could muster only two goals against the Predators during the regular season. Midfielders Nick Moore, Sam Bowen, Chuck Seltzer and Adam Heller added creativity and strong team play to provide a balanced attack and support on both ends of the field throughout the season and the playoffs.

The Predators also were finalists in preseason tournaments at Marlboro, New Jersey and Fort Dix. In the Fort Dix tournament, the Predators



had an identical record to winner Council Rock, but gave up one more goal against other teams to get edged out for the championship in the tie-breaking formula.

The Predators were coached by George Moore and Rob Taylor, with valuable assistance from George Bowen and Rick Seltzer. "The Predators won all season long because of strong team play and working together," said Moore. "They learned early on never to give up, and to trust in their teammates. As the season progressed, their level of play became so much better. Hockessin had beaten us soundly in the YMS tournament over Columbus weekend, and it was gratifying to see the team focus on improving and come back and actually dominate Hockessin in the final. Even though we could not put that game away, it was truly a victory. Everyone played like champions."

The Under 10A Velez finished the fall season with a record of 12-0-1, winning the Delco League Division One championship. The season was highlighted with a 5-1 win over Tredyffrin-Easttown in the championship game.

The Velez also won three tournaments during the fall season, the West Chester Classic in August, the Kick-off Classic in August and the Ross Haney Memorial Tournament in December.

Against premier teams in Division One, the Misfits scored impressive victories throughout the season. Led by their goalie Daniel Cooper, the Misfits used their defensive strength from players Alex Servetnick, Alex Margolies and J.J. Hoffstein to tire their opponents. Midfielders Andrew Gordon, Ian Smith and Jeff Blechschmidt distributed the ball with amazing accuracy upfield to their speedsters Max Fagan, Mark Krantz and John McCann. Henry Lobb and Slater McCue delivered size and aggressiveness while playing up front and in the middle.

The Under 10C Habañeros finished their 2001 Delco League season as finalists in Division Three. The Habañeros boasted a 9-2-0 regular season record and placed first in the Stroudsburg Columbus Day tournament.

In regular season play the Habañeros offense scored 33 goals while their stingy defense, anchored by ace goalie David Ancona-Cole, allowed only 12. Protecting the net along with David was the aggressive play of John "The Wall" Steele at sweeper and fullbacks Adam Sachs and Jake "Get Back" Ailor.

This year, the Habañeros ran a 13-man roster, which afforded them two offensive squads (yellow and red) and back-ups for players on injured reserve. Tirelessly driving up the middle for the yellow squad was Alex Cope. Alex was flanked by lightening fast wings Zach "The Flash" Blumenfeld and the unflappable Pierce Cohen. Mike Fallis' feinting, passing, and shooting rounded out the yellow squad by fortifying the back of the pack at stopper.

A tenacious defense was anchored by Michael Ayella-Silver, John Slochower, Brett Richardson and Jake Schutzman. Strong midfield play was headed by Kraig Lunkenheimer, Scott Berman, Scott MacGregor, Jake Karlsruhe, Andrew Mongeluzzi and Kevin Kostyk. Forwards Tyler Joseph, Mark Margulies, Tyler Olsen and Lester Robinson provided speed, skill and scoring touch to finish off the opponents. Above all, the players had FUN!

The Under 11A Hammerheads had another successful year and finished ranked #1 in the nation by National Soccer Rankings (www.nationalsoccerranking.com). With the great success of the Hammerheads over the years, the Delco League allowed the team to play up a year in Delco League's Under 12 Division One. This would prove to be a very tough task as all four of last year's State Cup semifinalists would also be competing in that division. The Hammerheads needed a win against Reading Berks in their last regular season game to make the playoffs. Danny DiLullo scored with five minutes left in the game to give the Hammerheads the victory and another trip to the Delco League playoffs.

In the semifinals, the Hammerheads traveled to Downingtown to play Spirit United, the current State Champions. Spirit had dropped a 1-0 decision to the Hammerheads during the regular season and were looking for revenge. Once again however, the Hammerheads defense proved tough.

Goaltender Matt Dilks recorded another shutout, with the help of defenders Tom Kalpokas, Sean Gillooly, David Dubow, Will Addis and DiLullo. The only goal of the game came from midfielder Colin Fleming who alertly knocked in a rebound from a Will Addis cross into the net.



The championship game saw the Hammerheads play the Lower Merion Disasters, our U-12A team. The Disasters had won the regular season encounter by the score of 2-1. In the finals, Greg Robbins gave the Hammerheads a 1-0 lead only five minutes into the game. The game remained scoreless until two minutes were left in regulation when Jon Fleisher got the equalizer for the Disasters. His goal sent the game into overtime. In the second overtime, Robbins scored his second goal of the game to give the Hammerheads their third straight Delco League championship.

Also during the fall, the U-11 Hammerheads won the 24 team Gettysburg Tournament, again playing up a year at Under 12. During their six games in this tournament, the team allowed zero goals. They won the championship game despite playing down a man for the last 45 minutes due to a red card. The Hammerheads also won the Parkwood Thanksgiving Day Weekend Tournament, again playing up a year in the U-12 age group.

The Monkeys won the YMS Columbus Day Gold Division, finished second in their bracket of the Ross Haney Tournament, and finished second in the Parkwood Turkey Bowl Tournament. The Under 11C Menace had a very successful "first" year. The team includes players from last seasons U-10 Lightning and Psychos teams, plus two players from the intramural league, Tim Reagan and Danny Rosner. The crisp passing and consistent play in midfield set up many exciting attacks from forwards Joe Holland, Brett Brenner, Danny Rosner, and Drew Peabody. While the team depended on goals and assists from Holland and Peabody off tight inside play, and Brenner and Rosner off longer range opportunities, the midfield and defense contributed to the scoring. Of particular note was Daniel Assiran's equalizer with seconds remaining in the final game of the season versus the division leaders. The tie clinched a playoff spot and sealed the Menace's undefeated regular season at an unusual 5-0-5. Both team and individual play improved throughout the season, and was notably assisted by a supportive parent base. Thanks to all for a fun and successful season.

The Under 12A Disasters finished off a successful Delco League season by reaching the championship game in a very competitive 12 team first division which included the Pa. State Cup champions, finalists, semifinalists, the top three teams from Delaware and the #1 ranked Under 11 team in the nation.

The Disasters made their push for one of the coveted Delco playoff spots by defeating the first place state champion Downingtown Spirit 2-1 on goals by forward Alex Gushner and sweeper Alex Melikian. Defender Reid Whelan preserved the win by sliding across the goal mouth to deflect a Spirit shot that was about to go into the Disasters' open net. Stopper Benny Schwartz and defender / midfielder Ryan Goldman and Ronald Richter were successful in shutting down Spirit's top scorers. Forwards Bobby Pierce-Cooke, Doug Ammon, Martin Goldfarb, Jon Fleisher, and midfielders Nikhil Gregg, Max Maguire, Dan Fedder, Scott Blumenfeld and David Cassanelli repeatedly broke down the Spirit defense creating scoring opportunities. Hustling forward Luke Fitzmyer provided added punch up front to keep the ball in Spirit's defensive end.

The Disasters' momentum was kept alive by an impressive 2-1 win over the eventual league champion LMSC Hammerheads. A head ball goal by Alex Gushner with Dan Fedder assisting gave the Disasters a lead at the start of the second half they would not relinquish. Forward Jon Fleisher provided the second goal with a blast into the upper corner. Martin Goldfarb assisted on the Fleisher goal and provided strong wing play throughout the game along with the speedy Doug Ammon and Bobby Pierce-Cooke. The midfield was controlled by David Cassanelli, Max Maguire, Scott Blumenfeld, and Nikhil Gregg. The tight marking defense was anchored by Ben Rossman, Ryan Goldman, Alex Melikian and Reid Whelan with Ronald Richter doing an exceptional job as the marking back. Gushner and Benny Schwartz split time in the goal for the victory.

The Disasters' playoff spot was clinched the following week with a 2-0 shutout of the tough Parkwood team. David Cassanelli and Alex Gushner provided the scoring punch beating Parkwood's offside trap while the midfield and defense repeatedly shut down Parkwood's offense.

The Disaster's 4-3 semi-final playoff win against the Harrisburg Super Nova Club played on Super Nova's "Next-Turf" field proved to be one of the most exciting play-off games in LMSC history. The Disasters came away with a double overtime penalty shootout victory and a trip to the Delco League championship game. After an early goal by Super Nova, Martin Goldfarb hit the post with a header and Doug Ammon and Nikhil Gregg were robbed by the Super Nova goalie. Late in the second half Alex Melikian connected with Nikhil Gregg who pounded the tying goal into the Super Nova net to send the game into overtime. Despite being triple teamed, David Cassanelli controlled the midfield along with Max Maguire, Scott Blumenfeld, Doug Ammon, Ryan Goldman, and Jon Fleisher. The stellar defensive play of Ron Richter, Ben Rossman, Reid Whelan, Alex Melikian and Benny Schwartz kept the Disasters within striking distance.

In the first overtime, goals by Jon Fleisher and Dan Fedder put the Disasters up 3-1 however Supernova came back to tie the game to force a penalty shootout. Calmly struck penalty shots by David Cassanelli, Ryan Goldman, Dan Fedder, Alex Melikian, and Reid Whelan sealed the win in almost darkness.

The Disasters played in the first ever Delco League Division One championship game featuring two finalists from the same club: the LMSC Disasters and the LMSC Hammerheads. Although the Disasters had come away with a victory against the Hammerheads during the regular season, the Hammerheads prevailed 2-1 with a goal in the second overtime period. The Disasters score came from Jon Fleisher with Bobby Pierce-Cooke notching the assist. The game was hard fought and well played by both LMSC Delco League finalists. The success of both teams was a credit to LMSC. With their excellent fall season, the Disasters became the #3 ranked team in the state.

The Under 12D Demolishers - After struggling in September (0-2-1 start), the Demolishers caught fire and went on a 5-1-1 streak to finish in third-place in U-12 Division Five. In the playoffs, the team had opportunities, but were victimized by counter-attacks, falling 3-1 to the speed of second-place King of Prussia.

Led by goalie Matt Piltch, the Demolishers allowed the least goals in Division 5, only 11 in 10 games, four goals fewer than any opponent. Charles Baron, Jake Eisenhard, Sam Hallowell, Mikey Pasek, Matt Taylor, and Nate Udren were tough-to-beat defenders. Sam Propper (6 goals), Jeff Gordon (4) and Sean Savett (3) led the offense, with Matt Hyman contributing five assists.

The Under 13B Rebels won four of their last five games, tying the other game against eventual champion East Brandywine, in Division Two of Delco this year. While their overall record of 4-5-1 was disappointing after having won two straight championships in 1999 and 2000, the Rebels' comeback at the end of the season served notice that they will be contenders again next year. "We just had a hard time meshing at the beginning of this season, and maybe we were a little overconfident at first," explained coach George Moore. "We just weren't sharp or focused, and that is a coaching failure. But the boys made us all proud by pulling together and turning it up in the second half of the season. We now have something to prove next year."

The 2001 Rebels consisted of Brandon Yoshimura, Ben Grant, Luke Rappoport, Jeffrey Puklin, Andrew Meinster, Alex Perilstein, Chris Giorno, Chris Gagnier, Sam Moore, Diego Krippner-Martinez, Aaron Gross, Eric Buckmann, Chris Lawrence, Jake Baumohl, Stuart Fleishman, Sam Kessler, Ryan Melvin and Tyler Schwartz. Howard Grant was the assistant coach.

The Under 14A Ocled is recognized nationally as the number three ranked team in the state. They enjoyed a successful fall season following last years Indoor State Cup Championship and Outdoor semi-final State Cup finish. The Ocled started the fall season in August with a second place finish at the Gettysburg Battlefield Blast.

For Columbus Day, they traveled to Hamilton, New Jersey where they took home the first place trophy. At Hamilton, the Ocled had a high scoring attack with 16 goals in their four games. Their offense combined with a rock solid defense that surrendered no goals the entire weekend. Included in their tournament victories was an impressive 2-0 victory over Columbia, one of the top teams in Maryland.



The Ocled competed this fall in the Delco League in the newly formed Under 14 Premier Division. In grueling league play against the top teams from Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware, the Ocled qualified for the playoffs with a fourth place finish. They lost to eventual champion (and three time State Champion) FC Delco in an exciting semi final match, 3-1. The Ocled was again led by an always-stingy defense, with goalies Zack Weimar and Jimmy Rosato, sweeper Josh Wilson, marking backs Drew Erickson, Brian Boyle and Gareth Jones, and stopper Matt Hittson, a welcome recent addition from North Carolina.

Midfield play was controlled by Martin Dell'Arciprete, Matt Hennessey, Andrew "Schmoo" Conroy, Zach Lieb, and Lee Bissett. The offensive scoring punch was supplied by Mike McCutcheon, Lee Rubenstein, Tommy Connelly and Chris DiLullo. The Ocled is competing this winter in the High School Junior Varsity division at Rocket Sports as they prepare to defend their Indoor State Cup championship and take aim at the Outdoor State Cup title this spring.

The Under 14B Arsenal finished in first place in Delco's Division Two league play this fall. After an opening game loss to Downingtown Spirit, LM Arsenal recorded 7 straight league wins to end up in first place with 21 points, two points ahead of East Brandywine and three ahead of Downingtown. All seven wins were tense, pressure-filled games, with each game decided by one goal in Arsenal's favor.

In the fall season, the play of the Arsenal team demonstrated well the old adage that "goals win games but defense wins championships." Arsenal played strong team defense throughout the season, recording three shut-outs and winning two others by 2-1 scores. While Arsenal players gained experience in multiple positions throughout the year, the back line of the defense was often anchored in the middle by Matt Yankowitz in goal, Ben Schutzman and Andy Richardson in central defense, and Dave Eisen, Eric Mustin and Dave Rublin handling outside defending duties. The team adopted a "ball-oriented defense" during the season, requiring strong covering play from workhorse midfielders. In many matches, this play was provided by Matt Byrne, Nick Carter, Dan Escott, Tyler Goldman, Robbie Goldwein, Tim Ichniowski, and Zach Malet. Striker duties were often handled by Erik Abi-Khattar, Matt Levin, as well as the team's leading scorers Max Fennell and Ben Smolen.

Lower Merion Arsenal dropped a very close match in the playoffs to Downingtown, 1-0, decided on a goal in the last minute of regulation. Still, regular season champion Arsenal ran their winning streak to eight games in the preceding playoff game by eliminating Radnor 2-1 on a last second goal in regulation by Tim Ichniowski and the game winner by Matt Byrne in the second overtime.

The Under 9A Flame completed their first full season in PAGS with great success. The Flames' first tournament was on Labor Day at Deep Run, where they finished with a 3 win, 1 loss record. Their only loss came to the champion, Pennridge, with less than one minute left in the game. On Columbus Day, the Flame traveled to Hamilton, New Jersey where they racked up 2 victories with 1 loss to the first place team.

In PAGS League play, the Flame finished in third place in the always-tough Division One with a record of 6 victories, 3 losses and 1 tie. The Flame defense surrendered only 8 goals over the course of the 10 game PAGS season. Defenders Claire McManus, Lauren Rhodes, and Sloan Warren, along with goalie Sarah Spector anchored their iron-clad defense.

AN LMSC COACH AT THE WORLD TRADE CENTER

The following article was written by Bob Overhiser, a long time coach at LMSC. On the morning of September 11, 2001, Bob was inside the World Trade Center when terrorists crashed planes into both towers.

The following is a brief account of what I experienced on September 11. My sincere condolences to any of you who suffered loss.

I am a Financial Advisor in Philadelphia. Circumstances came together to put me at ground zero. Our group of 300 people from all over the country had been on the 61st floor of the south tower of the World Trade Center since 7 am. We were taking a break from training sessions at 8:45. I had gotten a cup of coffee and was looking south over the harbor. Amidst the din, I was vaguely aware of a hum and what sounded like distant rumble of thunder. Suddenly there were multi-colored office papers fluttering about in the sunlight. Why would there be papers way up here? I guessed that a fire had started in a trashcan and had blown out a window. This was going to be international news and a big aggravation caused by a minor accident. How could it be anything else?

People on our floor who had been looking north came into our area and said that bodies and debris had been flying by. I did not believe them. Then one of those in charge of our floor called out. "This is much more serious than it looks. Exit the building via the stairwell. Do not get your belongings." I was walking to get my belongings when I breathed a whiff of smoke. Now I hustled to put down my coffee and head for the stairs. The building is on fire or so I thought. It was a long way down.

From the first steps in the stairwell there was a surprising order to the process. I will forever thank the people who shared our trip down those stairs for knowing what to do, staying one notch below panic, intelligently handling bottlenecks and, most of all, for not falling down! The lights were on, sirens were mute and that dreaded message on the public address system you all heard about went either unheard or unheeded. But our progress seemed slow: two flights for every floor; four floors for each chance to exit out of the stairwell should we become like sardines. And where were all of the people who would flood the stairs and cause a standstill? We saw only three the whole way down.

I was on the stairs at about the 18th floor when the stairwell pitched more than a foot from an explosion somewhere above us. "This is it," I thought. I am about to learn what it is like to have a building come down upon me. With every step feeling like it might be the last, we continued — at a faster clip — urging others to stay calm, as smoke began to enter the stairwell. When I got to the fifth floor, I felt I would make it out.

Once out of the stairwell, we were in the bowels of the building but had help, tragically as it would turn out, all along the way from Trade Center personnel. At last we came back up and out of the building and were told by the many amassed rescue personnel, "Don't look up. Move away from the building." When we were several hundred feet away, we looked up at the inferno of our tower but saw for the first time that the north tower was on fire as well. I, along with one other fellow, headed northeast where we could see some open space. Get me away from buildings and bombs!

When we were about four blocks away at the City Hall Park we tried to call our wives. It would be more than half an hour before I could get through to my wife Sharyl on the phone — and she like many of you saw it all in real time! She explained that planes had hit both buildings and elsewhere as well. My friend and I were stunned and really unable to move. Sharyl called the schools to have them advise our daughter Sarah and our son John that I was okay. The schools handled it well. We saw the collapse of our building from there and were a few blocks further away when the north tower collapsed.

I am, like all of you, still trying to absorb what happened. I have been back to ground zero to try to get closure. At this point I am very thankful for having survived and having been spared many of the horrific images first hand. I also feel guilt and anger. But most of all, I feel compassion for those who must live within the literal and figurative acrid smell of this event every day for the rest of their lives. We are so safe and fortunate here in Lower Merion.

Our LMSC U-13 boys soccer game on the first Saturday after the Attack was symbolic for me for many reasons: the moment of silence; the first opportunity to express to kids how safe I felt here in Lower Merion; my emotional statement that to play this game is both a right and a privilege; the beauty of the day; and the military aircraft flying overhead. I was very impressed by the maturity and purposefulness of the players on both teams. Now, more than ever, I cherish the values and purpose of the club and the growth of the players in so many ways.

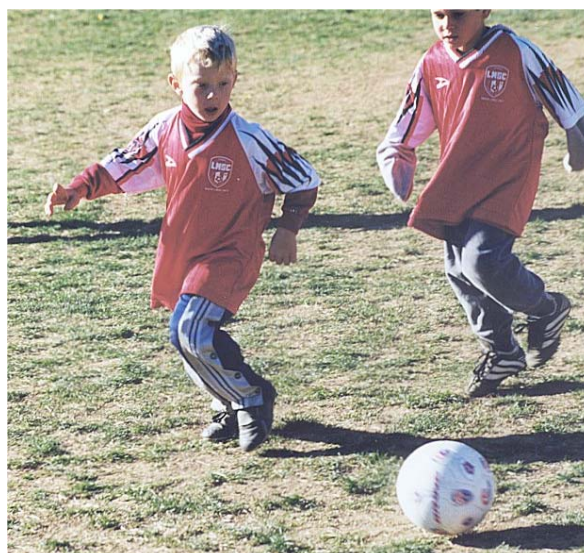
